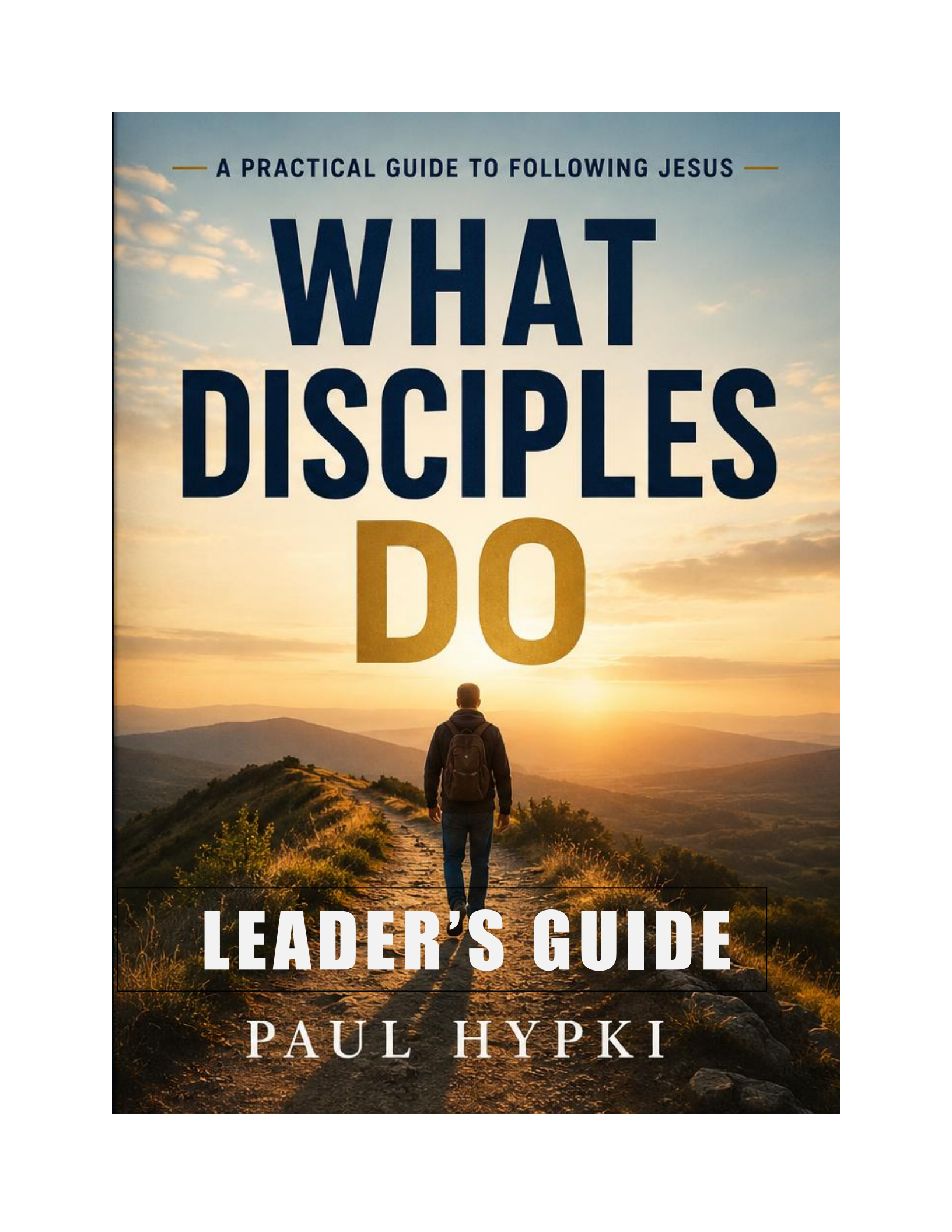

Using the *What Disciples Do* Leader's Guide

Each chapter of *What Disciples Do* ends with a *Living It Out* section. *Living It Out* includes three to five Think About It questions based on the chapter, a deeper reflection question, an Action Step, and a suggested memory verse.

New Christians who immediately became active in a small group are five times more likely to remain in the church five years later than those who were active in worship services alone.

This Leader's Guide provides additional material to help the leader discuss the material one-on-one or with a small group. The questions and suggestions are intended to help the leader guide a discussion. Read through the questions before your group meets. Don't feel each question needs to be covered, and feel free to jump around. You may cross out some questions that you don't want to get into. I hope you scribble your own questions in the white space. Also feel free to use the questions from the book as well as the questions in this Leader's Guide.

Please emphasize with the group that it is important to have read the chapter **before** coming each week. The discussion will be awkward if some people are not familiar with the material.

In this guide, each set of questions ends with *Last Week Follow-Up* and then *Application*. You might start with *Last Week Follow-Up*, before starting in on the current week's discussion. However, I find it easier to start with a more engaging question to get people talking. Discussing Last Week right before talking about what you plan to do this week emphasizes that they are expected to follow through.

EACH WEEK

Consider starting each week with a review of the memory verses, if the group chooses to take on memorization. For the first week, either tell people ahead of time or plan to review two verses during the second week. If you want the group to practice the verses together, choose a Bible translation and let your group know they should all plan to memorize the verses in that version.

Plan for about 60 to 75 minutes to discuss the chapter each week.

- Welcome and prayer – 5 minutes
- Icebreaker/Scripture memory review – 5 minutes
- Follow up – 5 – 10 minutes
- Discussion 25 – 35 minutes
- Application 10 – 15 minutes

- Closing Prayer – 5 – 10 minutes
- Remind group of next chapter to read – 1 minute

THIRTEEN, TEN AND SIX WEEK FORMATS

What Disciples Do is thirteen chapters. Thirteen chapters is great **if** your classes typically run for a full quarter of the year, or thirteen weeks. However, many groups intentionally ask for a shorter commitment of time from the group members. Suggestions on how to cover the material in six or ten weeks follow, but feel free to choose differently based on the needs of your group.

Also consider whether your group needs to spend much time on the Identity and Belong chapters, which cover baptism and church attendance.

THIRTEEN WEEKS

Thirteen weeks is the most natural approach, since there are thirteen chapters in the book. Plan to discuss one chapter each week, in order. The first week, discuss both the Introduction and Obey. During the last week, plan to cover Meditate and the Conclusion.

TEN WEEKS

Week 1 – Introduction and Obey

Week 2 – Read and Study

Week 3 – Pray

Week 4 – Confess

Week 5 – Rest and Belong

Week 6 – Share and Replicate

Week 7 – Identify

Week 8 – Serve

Week 9 – Give

Week 10 – Meditate and Conclusion

SIX WEEKS

Condensing the contents of What Disciples Do into six weeks will be a bit more challenging. Here is the suggested approach to a six-week study of the book.

A better approach for a six-week class may be to select the chapters that will be most helpful for the group you have in mind. If you follow this approach, I strongly recommend that Obey, Read, and Pray be included in the chapters you cover. The class participants can read the rest on their own, or perhaps they will be willing to sign up for a second six-week class.

What Disciples Do Leader's Guide

Week 1 – Introduction and Obey

If your group is mostly very new disciples, spend some time in the *Introduction* to ensure they understand there are no magic formulas to becoming a mature disciple. The *Introduction* and *Obey* are foundational to properly understand the rest of the material.

Week 2 – Read and Study

Read and *Study* are very closely related. When combining the two, spend most of the time on the material in *Read*, and then supplement that material with how to *Study* the Word of God more deeply.

Week 3 – Pray and Meditate

Pray and *Meditate* naturally blend as they discuss how to talk to God and how to think deeply about what He has spoken to us. Plan to spend equal time on both chapters.

Week 4 – Rest, Belong, and Confess

If you are leading this study as class with your church, the *Belong* chapter has information that will not be needed – specifically how to choose a church to attend. *Rest* is about how to properly observe a Sabbath, and *Belong* is about committing to attending a church, so they naturally come together. *Confess* is a practice that can really only be done with another strong disciple, whom you will most likely find in your local church.

Week 5 – Share, Replicate, and Identify

These three chapters flow nicely. We need to be able to *Share* what we know about Jesus to make more disciples, or *Replicate*, and we need to encourage those new disciples to *Identify* with the Church through baptism.

Week 6 – Serve, Give, and Conclusion

The *Serve* chapter is about finding opportunities to serve, and *Give* is about giving of ourselves as well as our finances to serve the Kingdom of Jesus.

Small Group Leadership

If you are brand-new to leading a small group, don't fret. We have all been brand new at one time. If you have time and a couple of dollars in your pocket, consider reading *Leading Life-Changing Small Groups* by Bill Donahue.

Key things to keep in mind are:

- Watch the time and end on time (or close to it)
- Ask questions and wait for people to respond – don't do all the talking
- Try to get everyone engaged – e.g. "Bill, what are your thoughts on that?"
- Bring the discussion back on topic when it strays
- Remember you are serving people, not clicking through an agenda

Most of all, have fun and get to know and enjoy the people in your group

Chapter 1 – Obey

Consider who will be in your group for the next several weeks. It may be worthwhile spending some time covering the material in the Introduction as well as the Obey chapter.

KEY THOUGHTS

Obedience is required of all disciples, but it does not earn us any favor with God. Our life in Christ is only because of His work and grace. We need to learn to avoid sinning and lean on God's Spirit through prayer to resist and repent.

DISCUSSION STARTER

Have you ever done something totally out of your comfort zone, like a somersault, that made you uncomfortable even though it was the right thing to do?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) Do you have any Twinkies in your life? How are you managing them?
- 2) What would it look like for a “modern-day disciple” to look like Jesus?
- 3) How often do you revert to trying to win God's favor by “being good”?
- 4) Are you choosing to display the fruit of the Spirit to people around you?
- 5) Was Samuel justified in getting so angry with Saul? Why or why not?
- 6) Tell us about a time when you heard God's Spirit speak to you.
- 7) Does Nehemiah's willingness to speak to the king inspire you or make you think you could never do that?
- 8) How is your self-worth impacted knowing you were made to do “good things”?
- 9) We all screw up, we sin, but how quickly do you stop and repent?

APPLICATION

When you are tempted to do something wrong this week, stop and pray for strength from the Holy Spirit. Repent *quickly* when you fail.

Get rid of the Twinkies in your life.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

James 4:17 *Remember, it is sin to know what you ought to do and then not do it.*

Chapter 2 – Read

KEY THOUGHTS

The Bible is like a love letter from God, and the more we read it, the more we understand His character, His plan, and what He desires from us and for us. Every disciples should read some Scripture every day.,

DISCUSSION STARTER

What is your favorite book you have ever read other than the Bible? Why?

Has anyone tried to read the whole Bible? How far did you get?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) How often do you read?
- 2) What is your view of the Bible? A. Book of rules. B. Stories and myths. C. Interesting history. D. Source of truth and guidance for everyday living.
- 3) What is your understanding of Truth?
- 4) How familiar are you with the Bible? Its layout? Its content?
- 5) Do you think words written nearly 3,500 years ago can still be relevant?
- 6) Can you remember the five groups in the Old Testament and the four groups in the New Testament?
- 7) Is anyone planning to use a reading plan to read the whole Bible?

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

Does anyone have a story of how they resisted doing something wrong this week? Did anyone get rid of some “Twinkies?”

APPLICATION

Decide a time each day when you will spend at least 10 minutes reading the Bible. If you don't have a Bible, get one (or download a Bible app). Tell the group which book you will read this week.

Tell two people this coming week something interesting you read in the Bible.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

Psalm 119:18 *Open my eyes to see the wonderful truths in your instructions.*

CHAPTER 3 – PRAY

KEY THOUGHTS

Prayer is just talking to God. Since we are now His, we need to talk to Him regularly about what is on our minds. Praying Scripture is a great way to start praying for others.

DISCUSSION STARTER

Have you ever prayed an outrageous prayer? Did God say, “Yes,” “No,” or “Wait?”

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) Make a list of the different kinds of prayers (praise for God's character, asking for a new job, ...)
- 2) Do you agree that it is important to pray specifically?
- 3) Does praying come easily to you, or does it feel uncomfortable?
- 4) Does it help knowing the Spirit helps us in our prayers?
- 5) Are you okay with the idea of God saying “No?” Especially for something *really* important?
- 6) Are you comfortable praying aloud in a group? Why or why not?
- 7) How do you handle it when you feel like God isn't listening or isn't there at all?
- 8) Do you think ACTS might help you pray more effectively or more often?
- 9) Do you believe your prayers have real power?

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

Who was successful in reading their Bible regularly this last week? Tell us about it?

APPLICATION

Choose a time to pray in the week ahead and pray then for at least three days. Perhaps right before or after you read your Bible. Consider using the ACTS approach.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

1 John 5:14-15 *And we are confident that he hears us whenever we ask for anything that pleases him. And since we know he hears us when we make our requests, we also know that he will give us what we ask for.*

CHAPTER 4 – CONFESS

KEY THOUGHTS

Consider watching the Andy Gullahorn video to start today's session. Confession is a neglected practice that can release our guilt and allow others to pray powerfully for our healing.

DISCUSSION STARTER

What sorts of things are you tempted to lie to your friends about, like in the song *I Haven't Either*?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) The word sin is not used much anymore, what do you usually call it when you have messed up, rebelled, done something you know is wrong?
- 2) Has anyone "gone to confession" with a priest? How would you describe the experience?
- 3) What do you do when you feel guilty and ashamed? How do you work out that tension?
- 4) Do you think about sin as "big sins" and "little sins"?
- 5) Do you feel like when you sin that God stops loving you? How can we change that thinking?
- 6) What is your biggest fear that would stop you from confessing your sins to someone?
- 7) Did you ever think that courage and confession were related?
- 8) Think about what you feel is holding you back most in your walk with God and life in general. Consider whether risking confession is worth it to gain freedom from what is holding you captive.

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

Who was successful in reading their Bible regularly this last week? Tell us about it?

APPLICATION

Consider who in your life you trust and set a time to confess a "small" sin to them this week. Perhaps it should be someone in this group.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

James 5:16 *Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The earnest prayer of a righteous person has great power and produces wonderful results.*

CHAPTER 5 – REST

KEY THOUGHTS

Setting aside time, ideally an entire day, each week to focus on our relationship with Jesus refreshes us and helps us to follow Him better all the other days.

DISCUSSION STARTER

When was the last time you allowed yourself to just stop, catch your breath, relax, and enjoy the moment? How did you do that and how did it feel?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) Did your family make Sunday a day of rest at all when you were growing up?
- 2) Do you have a routine that allows you to have regular time with God?
- 3) Are you more a human being or a human doing?
- 4) Did you realize that to take a day of rest was one of the Ten Commandments? What does that say about how important it is for us?
- 5) What can you say the next time someone asks who you are besides “busy?”
- 6) What are the activities that slow you down and help you to think about God?
- 7) It’s already been suggested that you read the Bible regularly; could you read even more on Sundays?
- 8) Who are the people you could visit on a day off? Jot down their names and consider calling them this week.

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

Did anyone arrange a time to confess to someone this week? How did it go?

APPLICATION

Figure out which day of the week can be your Sabbath and plan your time to make it a day of rest.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

Ezekiel 20:12 *And I gave them my Sabbath days of rest as a sign between them and me. It was to remind them that I am the Lord, who had set them apart to be holy.*

CHAPTER 6 – BELONG

KEY THOUGHTS

Every disciple needs to be part of a gathering of other disciples – a church. Joining a church gives us an opportunity for others to invest in us and for us to build others up.

Note: *This chapter touches on taking the Lord's Supper. There are different understandings of what "taking the elements" represents, held by equally godly men and women. Avoid getting into the weeds about what the Lord's Supper means and steer the discussion towards **why** we all should regularly partake together.*

DISCUSSION STARTER

Did you go to church when you were growing up? If so, what is a good experience or not so much?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) What are your top complains about church services?
- 2) Who are the people in your life that you most enjoy just being with? What about them makes you appreciate their company?
- 3) How would you explain to someone what it means to follow Jesus?
- 4) When you look at other disciples, do you think of them as your forever family?
- 5) What group(s) have you been involved in that made you feel part of the group? What was it that made you feel included?
- 6) What is your attitude when entering a church service? What are you hoping to get from your time there?
- 7) What can you do to stop attending and begin belonging to your church?

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

How did you rest in the past week? What would you recommend for others?

APPLICATION

Talk to some people at your church who you will spend time with and get to know better. Tell them you want to meet regularly with them so you can both get to know Jesus better.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

Hebrews 10:24-25 *And let us not neglect our meeting together, as some people do, but encourage one another, especially now that the day of his return is drawing near.*

CHAPTER 7 – SHARE

KEY THOUGHTS

We are not all evangelists, but we are ALL called to share our story with others. Our mission, as disciples, is to help people take just one more step closer to Jesus.

DISCUSSION STARTER

Have you ever told anyone else about how you came to know Jesus? Tell us how that happened?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) At bedtime, do kids want to hear their parents read a bed-time story or a report?
- 2) Most of us find it easy to talk about ourselves. How can we use that to turn the conversation to what Jesus has done for us?
- 3) Think back on your story – about how many steps did it take before you trusted Jesus?
- 4) What do you think of the definition of evangelism? “Working together with God and others to bring a person one step closer to God.”
- 5) Would you call your story interesting or boring? Explain why?
- 6) Are there people that God has put on your heart that you know you need to talk to? Share their first names so the group can pray for them.

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

Who did you talk to about meeting regularly?

APPLICATION

Write out your story and share it with *at least* one person this week.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

1 Peter 3:15 *Instead, you must worship Christ as Lord of your life. And if someone asks about your hope as a believer, always be ready to explain it.*

CHAPTER 8 – REPLICATE

KEY THOUGHTS

Making converts is not very valuable if we do not help them become disciples. Disciples should make disciples, and the church is strengthened and carries on to the next generation.

DISCUSSION STARTER

Who has helped you grow in Jesus the most? What have they done to help you?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) What are the places or situations where you feel uncomfortable talking about Jesus?
- 2) Who do you know that is a completely different person since they met Jesus?
- 3) Do you have a past temptation that God has completely taken away?
- 4) What picture comes to your mind when you hear the word *missionary*?
- 5) Do you know what gifts has God given you to help the church grow?
- 6) Who should you be spending more time with to learn how to live a God-honoring life?
- 7) Who should you be spending more time with to show them how to live as a Jesus follower?

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

Who did you share your story with this week? How did they respond?

APPLICATION

This week, ask someone to join you as you get to know Jesus better.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

Matthew 28:19,20 *Therefore, go and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age.*

CHAPTER 9 – IDENTIFY

KEY THOUGHTS

Baptism was expected almost immediately after conversion in what is recorded in the New Testament. Every disciple should be baptized to identify with the church, regardless of the cost.

Note: *Many solid churches hold different views on how and when baptism should take place. If your church's practice of baptism differs from what is presented in this chapter, be prepared to discuss why your church prefers to practice baptism as they do. Baptism should not be a topic of divisiveness! Rather, we should rejoice that all followers of Jesus are united in agreeing we should be baptized.*

DISCUSSION STARTER

Have you ever lost something someone who loves you gave to you (like a wedding ring)? How did that make each of you feel?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

The first two questions may be awkward if your church practices infant baptism. Feel free to skip them!

- 1) Were you baptized as a child? If so, are you comfortable that your baptism was appropriate and that you don't need to be baptized as an adult?
- 2) Do you see any problems with double-dipping? (being baptized as an infant and again as an adult)
- 3) Would you be willing to be baptized if it meant losing your job, getting kicked out of school, and having your family disown you?
- 4) What do you think of comparing baptism and a wedding ring? How did it help you understand baptism better?
- 5) How would you explain baptism to someone who is not yet a Jesus follower?

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

Who did you ask to join you as you follow Jesus? How did they respond?

APPLICATION

If you have not been baptized, talk to your pastor about doing so. If you have been baptized, mark your calendar for the next anniversary of your baptism and plan a little celebration.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

Acts 2:38 Peter replied, "Each of you must repent of your sins and turn to God, and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. Then you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

CHAPTER 10 – SERVE

KEY THOUGHTS

All disciples are called to serve, even as Jesus came to serve. Our service is often motivated by a godly love of others and is how people see the difference in Jesus' disciples.

DISCUSSION STARTER

Have you ever had a friend so close you felt you would be willing to die for them? Tell us about that friendship.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) What do you think it means to be a servant of Jesus?
- 2) Are you more comfortable serving or being served?
- 3) Talk about the ways the English word love is used?
- 4) Do you think it is possible to love someone when you are angry with them? When you don't particularly like them?
- 5) What would it take for you to slow down, notice people's needs, and serve them?
- 6) What are some simple acts we can do that serve other people?
- 7) How do we approach serving someone when it takes us out of our comfort zone?
- 8) What steps can you take so you are prepared to serve others?

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

Has anyone followed up with their pastor about getting baptized?

APPLICATION

Make a point to serve *at least* one person every day until our next meeting.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

Matthew 20:26 *But among you it will be different. Whoever wants to be a leader among you must be your servant.*

CHAPTER 11 – GIVE

KEY THOUGHTS

Giving is not just about money, but also our time, talents, and gifts. Our giving is to help the needy and to expand the Kingdom of God.

DISCUSSION STARTER

How generous were your parents? Did they give to church or other causes regularly?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) What do you think is the main reason God tells us to give generously?
- 2) Tell us about a time when you gave something to someone and felt really good about it?
- 3) How do you decide whether to give money to someone on a street corner?
- 4) Have you ever “erred on the side of generosity”?
- 5) Where is God calling you to take a stand for what is right?
- 6) Have you ever thought about supporting missions work happening in other countries?
- 7) What holds you back from being more generous?
- 8) We all like to get stuff, but tell us about a time it felt awkward to receive something from another person.
- 9) Who are the people around you that you can help?

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

What was your experience in serving other people? Any good stories?

APPLICATION

Review your giving. Make a plan to give more money or more of yourself so Jesus will be honored.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

Luke 6:38 Give, and you will receive. Your gift will return to you in full—pressed down, shaken together to make room for more, running over, and poured into your lap. The amount you give will determine the amount you get back.

CHAPTER 12 – STUDY

KEY THOUGHTS

Studying the Word is like a dog with a bone, getting everything possible out of it. Study helps us to better understand the original meaning of the Scripture and then apply it appropriately.

DISCUSSION STARTER

When you hear the word *study*, what is your immediate reaction?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) How would you explain the difference between *reading* and *studying*?
- 2) Have you used a Bible app? Which is your favorite version to read and why?
- 3) Back in school, how did you get to a place where you could study well?
- 4) Do you think it is important to know what the author originally meant when he wrote the words?
- 5) Are you by nature a light studier, a mature studier, or an over-achiever?

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

Tell us a bit about your plan to give more.

APPLICATION

Choose a short passage and study it this coming week. Be prepared to tell the group what you learned next meeting.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

Joshua 1:8 *Study this Book of Instruction continually. Meditate on it day and night so you will be sure to obey everything written in it. Only then will you prosper and succeed in all you do.*

CHAPTER 13 – MEDITATE

KEY THOUGHTS

Meditation is not emptying our minds but filling it with Scripture. By meditating on the Word, we give time for God to give us deeper insights.

DISCUSSION STARTER

What movie have you watched several times and see something new every time?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1) Are you a person who is prone to take time to think about things, or are you someone who is always on the go?
- 2) How does Christian meditation differ from other kinds of meditation?
- 3) Do you think meditation is just for the “super-spiritual” disciples?
- 4) Are there any stories in the Bible that you have wondered about the details of what happened?
- 5) What are your favorite questions to ask when reading the Bible?
- 6) Do you prefer to dig into a topic and find everything about it or dig into a story and figure out all the characters and background?
- 7) How does putting the Bible into our own words help us understand it?
- 8) Where does your mind go when you are stuck waiting with no phone in your hand?

LAST WEEK FOLLOW-UP

Which passage did you study, and what did you learn?

APPLICATION

Choose one passage and read it and think about it for at least 10 minutes a day for the next week.

SCRIPTURE MEMORY

Philippians 4:8 *And now, dear brothers and sisters, one final thing. Fix your thoughts on what is true, and honorable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable. Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise.*

What Disciples Do Leader's Guide

Sheet

Some people like to write things down. If the people in your group would like to, print off copies of the blank page for them to fill out. The *Key Thought* column is what God has spoken to them about the topic of the chapter. There are no right or wrong answers. Then the *How I Will Apply It* column is where they can jot down what they personally intend to do to put what they have learned into effect in their lives.

You may want to allow time at the end of each week's time together to allow people to fill in the line for that week. The sheet can be folder and tucked into the back of their book or their Bible.

The sheet below is filled with possible responses, just to give you an idea of what people might want to write. If they are stuck, you could share what is in the sample sheet, but try to let them come up with their own responses.
